

THE UNITED WAY IS A GREAT WAY TO PROVIDE A BALANCED PORTFOLIO OF SUPPORT TO KEY NON-PROFITS AND PROVIDE HIGH IMPACT SUPPORT TO EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT. WE ENSURE THE DONATIONS ARE SPENT WISELY. OUR BOARD IS A DIVERSE GROUP WITH DIRECTORS FROM INDUSTRY, NON-PROFITS, SMALL BUSINESS, PROFESSIONALS AND PEOPLE WHO CARE ABOUT HAVING A POSITIVE IMPACT ON THIS COMMUNITY. WE CONTINUE TO SUPPORT MANY OF OUR TRADITIONAL PARTNER AGENCIES WHILE SHARPENING OUR FOCUS ON TRULY MAKING AN IMPACT ON EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT WHICH HAS PROVEN TO MAKE SUSTAINABLE IMPROVEMENTS IN OUR COMMUNITY OVER TIME.

IN ADDITION TO TRADITIONAL FUND RAISING FOR PARTNER AGENCIES THIS YEAR OUR STAFF ALSO MANAGED PROGRAMS WITH EMPHASIS ON HIGH IMPACT AREAS. ONE SUCH PROGRAM IS THE DOLLY PARTON IMAGINATION LIBRARY. THIS PROGRAM HAS EXCEEDED ALL EXPECTATIONS FOR PARTICIPATION AND WILL PAVE THE WAY FOR CHILDREN PREPAREDNESS AS THEY ENTER SCHOOL.

IN OUR EFFORTS TO CONTINUE STRENGTHENING OUR FINANCIAL PROCESSES WE MOVED OUR BOOKKEEPING FUNCTION TO A LOCAL ACCOUNTING FIRM AND WE HAVE OUR AUDITS DONE BY A LOCAL CPA FIRM. WE HAVE GUIDED OUR PARTNER AGENCIES TO GRANT APPLICATIONS THAT TARGET IMPROVEMENTS IN AREAS WE FEEL ARE STRONGLY NEEDED LOCALLY. WE HAVE IMPLEMENTED A SOFTWARE SYSTEM TO SUPPORT THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS DECISION MAKING WHEN ALLOCATING MONIES TO THOSE AGENCIES WHO MAKE THE BIGGEST IMPACT IN TARGETED AREAS.

OUR STAFF IS DRIVING EXCITEMENT IN THE COMMUNITY FOR SUPPORTING THOSE IN NEED. OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR HAS BEEN RECOGNIZED BY THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AS A "RISING STAR" AND MORE RECENTLY THE UNITED WAY WON A CHAMBER AWARD FOR THE BEST LARGE NON-PROFIT. OUR TRANSITION TO BECOMING A HIGH IMPACT ORGANIZATION IS GENERATING EXCITEMENT FOR THE YEAR AHEAD. WE ARE POSITIONED WELL TO CONTINUE TO GROW WHILE BECOMING EVEN MORE FOCUSED ON EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT.
